If you're like most Brookline residents, you live so close, yet so far away, from ever coming close to these larger-than-life historic baseball moments. On Saturday, May 7th from 11:00 am to 5:00 pm at the Coolidge Corner Courtyard Marriott, Artbarn Community Theater brings the spirit of the Red Sox to Brookline.

A rare opportunity to be professionally photographed with the 2004 Red Sox World Series will be available that day with a donation to Artbarn Community Theater. Whether an individual portrait or a group photo, participants will receive an 8" x 10" piece of Red Sox history. Donations range from \$50 to \$100 depending on group size.

There's no fee; Artbarn will supply accompaniment and the taping for submission to the Red Sox organization for their selection.
